DOLPHINS

Dolphins are highly intelligent marine mammals. They are part of the family of toothed whales that includes orcas and pilot whales. In Hawaii, dolphins have been a magnet for tourists over the past decade. Tourists swim with them and have their photos taken. However, Hawaii might ban the tourist activity of swimming with dolphins. Officials say tourism harms the dolphins because they cannot rest or socialize. The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) wants to stop swimming with, or approaching within 50 metres of, dolphins. That may end many tour activities, such as sailing alongside the dolphins and snorkelling with them. However, the NMFS says the ban will not have a big impact on Hawaii's tourist trade. They think that by identifying 50 metres as the minimum distance, there still can be a viable tourist industry. But tour operators disagree. They say they cannot offer tourists the quality interaction that they expect.

STRESS-EATING

For many people, food is one of the easiest and fastest ways to cheer up in stressful times. Enjoying our food is pleasant. This has a scientific base. When we eat, two chemicals called dopamine and serotonin are released, which creates feelings of pleasure. However, according to the nutritionists, the effect of this release wears off quickly. Also, emotionally eating a lot of food with little nutritional value can damage our health by weakening our immune systems, which has a negative effect on human psychology. Emotional eating can also worsen our moods because people might feel guilty for eating unhealthy and highly processed foods containing a lot of sugar. In addition, eating these foods can cause some disorders which can lead to fatigue, anxiety, and depression. Nutritionists also state that eating as a result of stress can be an automatic instinct, such as grabbing a biscuit without thinking about it. By contrast, physical hunger lasts longer. Hunger can also be resolved with a variety of foods, rather than just with junk food, and it is wise to ask yourself whether you are physically hungry or whether you want to eat just because you feel blue.

PROTECTING THE SEA LIFE

In the United States, there are natural parks to preserve the nature. Also, some marine areas are being preserved to protect marine life against any threats. These areas have too many visitors each year, so their nature is likely to suffer from pollution or overfishing. Apart from the human-related dangers, there are some other natural threats such as hurricanes or floods. The ocean environment has a variety of coral reefs, plants and creatures, and protection becomes a kind of a shelter for them. The more protected the area is, the more diversity there is in the region. When people protect the marine life, they also help human population. For example, the plants like seagrasses provide oxygen, which is vital to survive on the Earth. DOUBLE-DECKER BUSES

In any pictures, illustrations, photographs of England, it is very likely to see a red double-decker bus. This iconic vehicle is a bus that has two storeys. They are widely used for public transportation both by commuters and tourists in the country, and they have become one of the images that symbolize Great Britain. However, the United Kingdom is not the only place where you can see double-decker buses. You can also see them in other places such as East Europe or Asia. The driver was in a separate part in the earlier versions of double-decker buses, and there was a bus conductor to receive the fares from the passengers who got on the bus through the rear open entrance platform. Because of some safety concerns, bus companies abandoned the use of the rear open platform. Indeed, it is no surprising that it was precarious for the passengers, for it was highly probable to fall down from the bus through the open entrance. On a modern double-decker, people get through the front door, and there is no need for a conductor because the driver can take the fares.

IMDb

Many people are familiar with the worldwide famous online shopping company, Amazon, but they may not know that Amazon owns another worldwide famous webpage, IMDb (Internet Movie Database). It is an online database, and it provides information related to certain productions such as movies, television shows, or video games. If a person searches a TV show on IMDb for example, they can find many details about the show including its cast, production crew and personal biographies, plot summaries, or ratings by registered users. Besides, it is possible to see reviews by fans and critics. Until February 2017, it had been possible for fans to write messages on specific boards. As of January 2020, in this database, there are approximately 6.5 million released titles (including episodes of shows and programs) and nearly 11 million personalities like actors or producers, and there are over 83 million registered users around the world.
